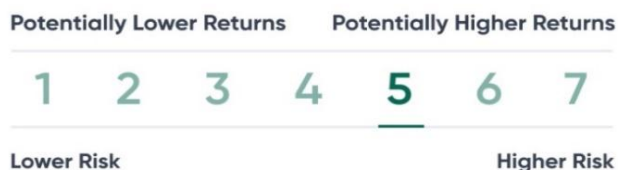
Description of this fund

The Kernel S&P Global 100 Fund invests in globally listed multi-national, blue-chip companies and is designed to track the S&P Global 100 ex Controversial Weapons Index (NZD).

What are the risks of investing?

Risk indicator for the Kernel S&P Global 100 Fund:



The risk indicator is rated from 1 (low) to 7 (high). The rating reflects how much the value of the fund's assets goes up and down. A higher risk generally means higher potential returns over time, but more ups and downs along the way.

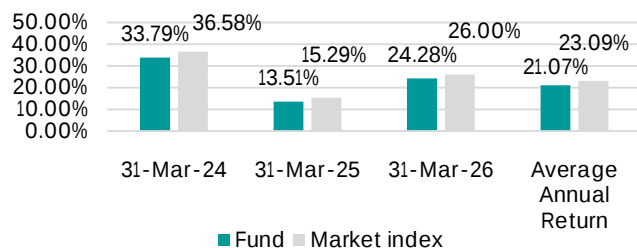
How has the fund performed?

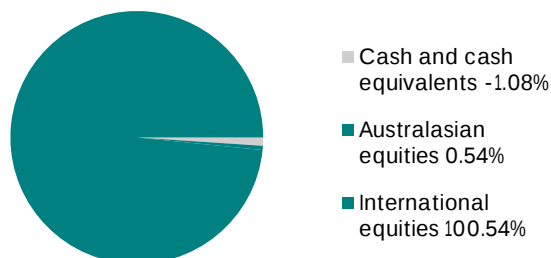
Investors are not charged individual action fees for specific actions or decisions (for example, for withdrawing from funds). All fees are inclusive of GST.

Example of how this applies to an investor

Emma had \$10,000 in the fund on 1 July 2025 and did not make any further contributions. On 30 June 2026, Emma received a return after fund charges were deducted of \$3,680 (that is 36.8% of her initial \$10,000). This gives Emma a total return after tax of \$3,502 for the period.
